PRIVILEGE HAS ITS LIMITATIONS

Tom Cafferty, general counsel for the New Jersey Press Association, spoke on the issue of reporter's privilege — a series of laws and precedents granting people involved in reporting news and information the right not to reveal their sources and their information and notes — whether they publish a story or not.

"The concept of 'public good' is behind reporter's privilege," Cafferty said, "since it is generally accepted that without confidential sources there would be fewer 'whistle blowers,' people who are able to tip the media anonymously when they believe everything is not cricket in government or business."

While the First Amendment to the Constitution says "Congress shall make no law...abridging the freedom of speech or of the press," interpretation is a matter left up to the courts — resulting on ongoing controversy concerning when reporter's privilege applies. According to Cafferty, such controversy is not new to American society. He cited examples of similar cases dating back to before the Revolution.

The issue has become more public than usual with the recent jailing for contempt of court of Judith Miller of *The New York Times*, who didn't write a story, but refused for a while to reveal a source. This is why Miller, Robert Novak of the *Chicago Sun-Times* and several Bush administration officials are currently involved in a lengthy grand jury investigation centered on James Wilson, a diplimat and critic of the Bush administration's rationale for the Iraq war, and his wife, Valerie Plame, a CIA operative who's identity was revealed in a story written by Novak.
