DISTRICT GOVERNOR IS ACCESSIBLE, HAS HUGE NUMBER OF PROJECTS GOING, AND WANTS YOUR PARTICIPATION!

District Governor Andy Calamaras, a marketing executive and civic volunteer from the Fanwood/Scotch Plains area and former president of his Rotary Club, took a modest and informal approach in his address to the Flemington Rotary, combined with obvious determination to motivate us to achieve progress on crucial Rotary programs.

He complimented – and applauded – our club on the number of participants and the great number of things we achieve each year. Then, he went on to describe plans for the year ahead, laying out the details of several programs and the reasons they are worthy of our financial and participatory support.

He said that District Governors (DG) meet with the Rotary International president before their terms begin. Typically, much of what the DGs bring to their districts and clubs is in line with the goals set by the RI president. The focus of this year's Rotary President, Karl-Wilhelm Stenhammar of Sweden (that's Karl-Wilhelm, not Karl, to you), is clean water, health, hunger and literacy.

Our district is focusing primarily on water through a program, called "Pure Water for the World," which provides water filters that will supply a family with clean water for seven years. Rotarian Byron Miller, our district chair, works in the water industry and is currently in Honduras distributing filters. Our district goal is 133 filters, at \$75 a piece, totalling \$10,000.

Another area of concentration for the district is literacy, specifically the "dictionary project." Dictionaries are distributed by Rotary Clubs to school children. Amazingly, even wealthy suburban school districts like Andy's home district of Scotch Plains, which provide computers for students, don't provide dictionaries. The third-grade kids can't wait to get them and put their names in the inside front cover. The goal is 100% participation by clubs in the district. Details will be forthcoming.

Andy pointed out that ultimately, small goals can lead to big results, like the promotion of world peace. If you provide clean water to the people of the world, feed them so they don't have to go hungry, help them educate themselves so they can provide for themselves, they will have no reason to go to war. Examples are Rotary-sponsored Homes for Hope in Ecuador and the City of Hope in Brazil.

Apparently, Karl-Wilhelm Stenhammar is less interested in meeting with the Pope and heads of state than he is in meeting with ordinary Rotarians. — Continues on the back
