PLANNING PROCESS BEGINS NEXT WEEK

This is the organization's 15th year and about 80,000 bicycles have been donated and shipped around the world. About 1,000 of these came from the Flemington area.

HOSPITAL ACHIEVES ANOTHER MILESTONE

Bob Wise reported that 9 hospitals in NJ, including Hunterdon Medical Center, achieved outcomes of care where mortality rates were on average 27% below the national average among the 5,000 hospitals surveyed!

DON FREIDAY KNOWS THE NEIGHBORHOOD

Don Freiday, of the New Jersey Audubon Society, invited us to join the 21,000 members of the organization and its staff of 55 in their threefold effort: conservation, environmental education and wildlife research.

One example of their research is uncovering the reason for near extinction of the Red Knot: over-fishing of the Delaware Bay horseshoe crabs, whose eggs are a source of food for this bird. The bay is a stop-over for nine species of birds, all of whom are threatened by the horseshoe crab decline. The society has joined other conservation groups in

petitioning for a moratorium on horseshoe crab fishing.

Another concern is habitat health. A recent "white paper" detailed many of the stresses to natural habitat occurring in this area. Surprisingly, the society supports "lethal control" of white-tailed deer, whose population is one of the major stressors of our environment.

Don also showed an intimate knowledge of wildlife activity that some of us simply don't notice.

For instance, turkey vultures are increasing in Hunterdon County. They usually feed on deer carcasses, which are on the increase. Don says, "You have to be a sorry vulture in Hunterdon if you can't make a living."

He said that lots of things begin to change here in February, making it one of the most interesting times of the year for nature lovers. Over 25 species of migrating birds come through, including wood ducks, northern pintail ducks, redwing blackbirds and grackles.

Eastern bluebirds are perched on wires these days on Everitts Road, and can be seen as you drive around. These birds are a success story. They declined early in the Twentieth Century, partly due to pesticides and competition with the European Starling, an introduced species. Now they are back and just waiting for you to clean out your nesting boxes. Their courtship process is similar to that of humans where, according to Don, the male goes from nest site to nest site saying, "Hey, honey. How 'bout this one?"

Canada geese are also pairing up, earlier than in the past due to warming trends and a shortage of nesting sites. Many geese still migrate, but most of our geese are "resident" and stay here all year. They were established deliberately by the US Fish and Wildlife Service, which released nestlings who imprinted on our area and never learned to migrate.

Red foxes are beginning to mate, so you may see them during the day or hear their cries at night. The young are born in April and are not independent until late summer.

Grey squirrels are finishing one of their two annual breeding cycles. These young will be born in late March.

This is the most difficult time of year for whitetail deer, who move into landscaped areas as their food runs out. But it's less a problem in Hunterdon than elsewhere because of our extensive deer-friendly habitat.

Worldwide, naturalists are just beginning to understand the implications of global warming and ozone deterioration. For example, the yearly "calendar" of many species has changed due to warming trends, and increased ozone has made some species more vulnerable to parasites.

While most environmentalists are "gloom and doom," Don believes there is "nothing out there that is insurmountable with proper action" and that there are many good news stories.

Don suggests that since the world often doesn't make sense, it can be refreshing to look outside and see how nature makes a lot of sense.
