"TICKED OFF" BY NINE THINGS THE MEDIA DO

John O'Brien, who manages the state's newspaper trade association, pulled from the perspective of his long and distinguished career in journalism to analyze what he sees as a deterioration of news coverage by the nation's media.

"News informs and enlightens the citizens of a free society," he said, "but media have the potential to erode the public trust upon which they depend."

"The fragmentation of media channels due to cable and the Internet have made the situation worse, since it is easier for some media elements to drift into their own mindset and cater to a small, opinionated audience. In a worst-case scenario, the media can even erode the democratic system of which they are a crucial part."

"The remedy is for journalists to seek facts and truths, rather than merely seeking ratings and profits." Having said that, John listed his pet peeves:

News or Entertainment. "There is an increased blurring of lines between journalism and entertainment. News coverage that puts too high a priority on entertainment is always destined to distort and mislead. Even worse, entertainment that masquerades as news taints and tarnishes real journalism. We don't even know who a journalist is any more, since politicians moonlight at moderating news shows and political editors become political consultants and celebrity journalists accept \$25,000 fees for speaking engagements."

News or Opinion. "There is a blurring of lines between news and opinion — once a clear distinction. Newspapers still have a format — news pages and editorial pages — that helps maintain these distinctions. TV and most magazines don't. Part of the problem lies in fashionable new philosophies that argue that there are no basic values of right and wrong and that objectivity is impossible. This view is a "dagger in the heart" of genuine journalism."

Pack Journalism. "Most journalists are decent, fairminded people, individualists, not conformists. But when a few dozen reports chase the same story, they sometimes become a pack of hounds in pursuit of a quarry, losing standards of accuracy and decency."

Covering the Extremes. "While most Americans have moderate views of social and political issues, media tend to cover extreme views and extreme actions. 'If it bleeds, it leads.' Journalists need to recognize that such portrayals can shape our society and distort public opinion. The fragmentation of media channels exacerbates this problem."

Exaggerated Pessimism. "An exaggerated tendency toward pessimism can distort news coverage. This is not to be confused with skepticism, which is essential for good news coverage. War coverage is a prime example where pessimism 'pays' for the media, since gloom and doom sell papers."

"Lorena Bobbitt Journalism." "A growing fascination with the bizarre, perverse and pathological magnifies the significance of crackpots and criminals and, by implication, legitimatizes deviant behavior. Editors need to ask whether such stories are news at all."

Political Correctness. "The job of journalism is to get beyond stereotypes, heroes and villains, to question, probe and challenge conventional views. Reporters should reveal whether so-called leaders speak for real constituencies, or for cliques and narrow interests, and examine more than one side to every issue.

"The danger grows as political leaders and social pressure groups have become increasingly sophisticated in feeding and manipulating the media. For example, we have a public relations presidency and a host of social activists and self-interested class action lawyers who rely on the media to amplify often simplistic, self-serving messages."

Short Attention Span. "While the larger issues and bigger problems in our society require sustained attention, the media bombard the public with simplistic sound bites lacking in perspective. On the other hand, the public is complicit in demanding overly simplified coverage."

Power. "While the media are responsible for increasing public skepticism toward large and powerful institutions, the media themselves have become powerful institutions. They have more influence on public opinion than members of Congress or many of the corporations they cover.

"Accuracy, fairness, open-mindedness, the pursuit of various views, accountability, modesty and human decency should be standards imposed by the media themselves since, given the immense power of media organizations, there are fewer externally imposed standards.

"Most media attempt to provide serious news for serious people. But both the media and the public need to pay attention when news drifts into entertainment, oversimplification, opinion, extremism, sensationalism or distortion — due to a herd mentality, conflicts of interest or the power of media organizations themselves."
