Members talked about the failure of past assemblies where similar issues were discussed but results were marginal because of the too-large forum.

Mick suggested a series of small group gatherings with one person at each to record ideas for recruiting and retention. Suggestions from all groups would be compiled and the best of them hashed out at a regular club meeting.

Ira Leibowitz suggested that an online discussion could be a convenience to many.

President Harry Mazujian asked members interested in tackling the problem to contact him.

RI selects scholars from low-income countries

The Rotary Foundation has selected 27 people from lowincome countries to receive Ambassadorial Scholarships for university studies in 2008-2009. Each year, 10 percent of the program's recipients are selected from low-income countries

This year's recipients are citizens of Ethiopia, Guatemala, India, Kazakhstan, Kosovo, Macedonia, and Tanzania, among other areas. They will study at Harvard and Johns Hopkins universities in the United States; Simon Fraser University in Canada; Uppsala University in Sweden; and Victoria University of Wellington in New Zealand. Their chosen fields include law, psychology, medicine, business, and public health.

Since it was created in 1947, the Ambassadorial Scholarships program has supported more than 38,000 students from about 100 countries -- more students than any other privately funded, university-level international scholarships program in the world. Total funding: \$490 million.


